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

### "Local Chamber of Commerce Discussed May 13" read a headline on the

front page of the local newspaper, *The Conyers News*, on April 23, 1954. The article stated, "All Rockdale County Citizens are requested to bear in mind that there will be a mass meeting in the county courthouse on Thursday, May 13, at 8 p.m., to discuss the organization of a Conyers-Rockdale County Chamber of Commerce."

Speaking earlier that week to the Lions Club, A.R. "Gus" Barksdale was quoted in *The Conyers News* as saying, "The mass meeting is for the purpose of forming a permanent organization. Membership is open to all persons, business concerns, associations, industrial plants, and others." (As is membership in the Chamber today.)

Three weeks later, more than 80 local citizens as well as representatives from the Georgia and U.S. Chambers of Commerce crowded into the courthouse to attend the organizational meeting. "Practically every firm in the county was represented including the City Council," commented Jack Turner, one of the Chamber founders. The vision – the industrial development of the area – was discussed, Jack Turner was elected President, and the first regular meeting was set for the following Tuesday, May 18, 1954.

At its inaugural business meeting, the newly formed organization elected additional officers, named a Board of Directors and committee chairs, established a dues structure, and began the work of expanding industrial opportunities in the area.

The additional officers were Charlie Rich, vice president, and C.E. Steele, secretary/treasurer. The Board of Directors included representatives from the four rural districts of the county: Charlie Rich, Milstead; Ralph Richardson, Lorraine; J.W. Smith, Sheffield; and W. J. Parr, Honey Creek. There were also eight Conyers businessmen: Eli Walker, Harry Hutson, James C. Mann, A. R. "Gus" Barksdale, Ralph Beasley, R.H. Still, C.E. Steele, and H.E. Griggs.

In less than six months, Chamber membership was approaching 135 businesses and individuals. The office of the Mid-Georgia Gas Company, where Turner served as Manager, was designated as the Chamber's headquarters.

Nearly 70 years later, the Conyers-Rockdale Chamber of Commerce is still working to support industrial opportunities. However, the Chamber has expanded its vision over the years to focus on people and programs by being an advocate for a pro-business community, developing networking opportunities, supporting small business through special programs and training sessions, and making connections with government entities, non-profit groups, faith-based organizations, and local citizens. The Chamber seeks to promote progress and enhance the quality of life in this place we call home - Conyers/ Rockdale County.

### First Chamber Members

The new Chamber of Commerce sparked excitement in the community. Within two months, the young Chamber had more than 100 members - individuals and businesses alike. In a July 16, 1954, article in *The Conyers News*, Chamber President Jack Turner is quoted as saying, "We are well pleased with the progress. ... We feel the response has been most gratifying."

A complete list of members (some of whom are still members today) was published on October 10, 1954. Below is the roster of the original Chamber members as they were listed in the newspaper. In this issue, Turner said, "The committees are working every day toward the development of Rockdale County." He continued to urge more citizens to get involved.

# Small Town Big Dreams

### Living life in 1950s Conyers/Rockdale County seemed easy.

A small town, families could enjoy a quiet lifestyle, while still experiencing the more modern amenities of the big city down the road. Small farms dotted the landscape, Callaway Mills, Rockdale County's largest business, was operating in Milstead and employing many local citizens, and the City of Conyers, situated on the busy railroad, was thriving.

Residents visited downtown Conyers for shopping at primarily family-owned stores selling dry goods, hardware, furniture, clothing, shoes, jewelry, and so much more. This busy area included a movie theater, post office, two hotels, dry cleaners, taxi service, and a variety of repair shops as well as other services. Families were growing, and more were moving into the area. Change in the form of growth and development for Rockdale County was imminent.

Recognizing the need to make the anticipated progress orderly, a visionary group of businessmen established the Conyers-Rockdale Chamber of Commerce in 1954. Expanding economic opportunities provided the incentive and many of the Chamber's original organizers had just experienced some success with growing industry in Rockdale County, so the timing was right. Prior to establishing the Chamber, about 15 to 20 local businessmen had raised money to build a new plant to house the Pacific Overall Company that had outgrown its original location. This success, combined with the area's proximity to Atlanta, access to the railroad, and a growing labor force, likely propelled the Chamber's early accomplishments.

The newly established Chamber board and, specifically, the members of the Industrial Committee, led by A.R. "Gus" Barksdale, immediately got to work. The first industry secured by the Chamber was the Kaiser Aluminum Company Warehouse, which broke ground on May 24, 1956. The

members predicted that many more industries would choose to locate in Conyers/Rockdale County – and they were right!

The Chamber's executive team understood that to entice new industry to the area, Conyers/Rockdale needed an industrial park. Soon after beginning operations, the Chamber purchased 28 acres to be used for industrial expansion on the west side of town near Rockdale Industrial Boulevard. The Pattillo Construction Company built the industrial buildings. A group within the Chamber purchased additional land between West Avenue and VFW Drive for even more industrial expansion.

When executives at Lithonia Lighting, a manufacturer of lighting fixtures, which began in the neighboring city of Lithonia in 1946, decided they wanted a location for a new plant, they first applied to a group of Covington businessmen. The company was unable, however, to get the local support necessary and were

consequently turned down. Forward-thinking members of the Conyers-Rockdale Chamber of Commerce seized this opportunity and contacted the company themselves.

On August 30, 1956, the Chamber launched a fundraising drive to finance a building for Lithonia Lighting. Rockdale County citizens gave the Chamber their wholehearted support by purchasing subordinated debentures in the amount of \$500. The building, which cost approximately \$750,000, was completed in 1957 and remains operational in Rockdale County.

The addition of Lithonia Lighting proved to be an excellent investment for this community. Callaway Mills,

which employed around 900
people, closed in 1960. At least
one third of its employees
were citizens of Rockdale
County. Most of these outof-work employees were
absorbed by Lithonia Lighting,
relieving what could have
been an unemployment crisis.
Lithonia Lighting is today a
part of Acuity Brands, one of
the world's leading providers

of lighting and building management solutions.

This event reinforced the significance of growing business and industry in Conyers/Rockdale County. Within five years of operation, the Chamber had successfully facilitated the addition of six new industries into the area. The 1960s saw even more growth with the opening of Interstate 20 and the addition of at least 14 new industries, many of which remain in our community today. For the next 30 years, industrial and manufacturing growth in Conyers/Rockdale County continued at a steady pace with the Chamber leading the charge as more and more industries and manufacturers discovered the unique attributes of Conyers/Rockdale County.

With the new millennium on the horizon, the city and county governments worked closely with the Chamber to facilitate opportunities for economic development. They recognized that as Georgia's second smallest county in terms of land mass, future industrial and commercial development might be limited and present new challenges and opportunities. Many conversations and strategic approaches to continue economic success in our community were developed and discussed. Finally in 2004, Chamber leadership, with financial support from the City of Conyers, Rockdale County Government, and the Development Authority of Rockdale County, established the Conyers Rockdale Economic Development Council (CREDC) as a separate entity dedicated to promoting and enhancing economic development in all its forms from industrial to commercial, institutional to retail, residential to hospitality, and filmmaking to tourism.

CREDC continues to lead economic development efforts with support from Rockdale County and the City of Conyers in partnership with the Conyers-Rockdale Chamber of Commerce and the Development Authority of Rockdale County as well as the hospital, school system, local business and industry, faith-based organizations, and non-profits. These

Early on, organizers of the Conyers-Rockdale *Chamber of Commerce recognized that a vibrant,* thriving community was essential to recruiting business and industry to the area. A safe place to raise a family, opportunities for recreation and relaxation, cultural experiences, a quality school system, and access to healthcare, were some of the ideas top of mind for those looking to locate here as well as for existing residents – even 70 years ago.

From the onset, Chamber members have been involved either as leaders or facilitators in bringing and/or promoting organizations, events, festivals, and activities that contribute to an outstanding quality of life. With the goal of being the catalyst for creating a probusiness environment, Chamber members agreed that Conyers/Rockdale County would always be a great place to work, to live, and to play.









Recognizing that accessibility to quality healthcare in the community would benefit local citizens as well as help attract new business, many of the same forward-thinking leaders who established the Chamber supported local doctor Joseph C. Brown's dream of establishing a hospital in Conyers/Rockdale County. The dream became a reality in August 1954. Rockdale Hospital, a 10-bed facility, opened with great fanfare.

Local citizens, government entities, civic organizations, Chamber leaders, and the Callaway Foundation were instrumental in providing funding and other resources. Nearly 70 years later, Rockdale Hospital is now Piedmont Rockdale, a state-of-the-art facility dedicated to providing high-quality healthcare to residents throughout east Atlanta. With more than 400 board-certified and credentialed providers, the 161-bed, acute-care hospital continues to exceed expectations.

"The hospital, supported by the Conyers-Rockdale Chamber of Commerce since its inception, has been an integral piece of the community's foundation," commented Deborah Armstrong, retired Rockdale Medical Center CEO who served as the 2015 Chamber Board Chair.

Relief (RER) was founded by local
citizens, civic groups, and businesses
to provide financial assistance
to county residents who found
themselves in emergency situations.

Incorporated in September 1967, the agency was managed for many years by the Conyers-Rockdale Chamber of Commerce and the United Fund (and eventually became a member agency of the Metropolitan Atlanta United Way).

Throughout the years, RER has remained steadfast in its mission to offer "a hand up, not a handout," as current RER Director Sandra Jackson-Lett explains. "RER seeks to help families regain stability by addressing their urgent needs so they can get back on the road to self-sufficiency."


Supporting high quality education has always been a top priority in Conyers/Rockdale County. Since its inception, Chamber members have worked closely with the school system to support students, teachers, programs, and projects.

In 1988, the Conyers-Rockdale Chamber of Commerce and the Rockdale County Board of Education, recognizing that new funding sources for educational activities needed to be secured, established the Rockdale County Public Schools Foundation (RCPSF). These business-minded leaders understood that tax dollars alone could not support all the educational opportunities necessary to assure the students of Rockdale County an excellent education.

Celebrating its 35th year in 2023, the Foundation continues to advocate for public education and to raise money through tax-deductible contributions to support educational programs and projects not covered in the school system's regular budget.

Governed by a volunteer Board, the Foundation is a non-profit, tax-exempt organization. With the Chamber's continued support and leadership, RCPSF has funded creative and educationally beneficial activities through its classroom grant program, provided teachers with opportunities to participate in continuing education, and awarded scholarships to students.





The Conyers-Rockdale Chamber of Commerce working with Maxell Corporation and a host of volunteers launched the first Cherry Blossom Festival in March 1982. The idea originated when Maxell Corporation, which opened a facility here in 1980, donated cherry trees to the City of Conyers as a way of expressing friendship and sharing Japanese culture with the community. Wayne Ingle, who served as Chamber Board Chair in 1985, recalls visiting Japan early in the planning process "to view their cherry trees in bloom and to partake in their local traditional celebrations. When we originally launched the festival, the events focused on the Japanese culture," explained Ingle.

From a simple gesture of kindness more than 40 years ago, the Conyers Cherry Blossom Festival has grown to include thousands of participants from many diverse cultures. Scheduled during the blossoming of the beautiful Yoshino Cherry Trees each spring, the festival encourages cultural understanding and friendship through international music, dance, arts, crafts, food, games, and entertainment for all ages. Coordinated by the City of Conyers with support from the community, and held at the beautiful Georgia International Horse Park, the Cherry Blossom Festival is a much-anticipated tradition.

"The World Comes to Conyers," read the bold headline in The Rockdale Citizen on Thursday, October 23, 1991. A photo below the headline featured the smiling faces of dozens of exhilarated people who had worked tirelessly to achieve the lofty goal of bringing the 1996 Olympic Equestrian Events to Conyers/Rockdale County. However, without foresight and planning among leaders in this community, including the Chamber, the story might have had another ending.

Prior to Atlanta being named as the host for the 1996 Centennial Olympic Games, the City of Conyers had been considering options for developing an equestrian center in north Rockdale.

When it was announced that Atlanta would host the 1996 Summer Games, the Atlanta Committee for the Olympic Games (ACOG) stated that they would be developing facilities to host the equestrian events at a site only 30 minutes from Conyers. City officials realized that holding these events at a site so close to Conyers would render their plan impractical.

Optimism prevailed, however, when local leaders learned that the site originally slated to host the equestrian events would not be hosting them after all; ACOG would be looking for another site! Described as a dream-team, the Conyers-Rockdale Equestrian Task Force was formed including leaders from the City of Conyers, Rockdale County, the Chamber, and the community at-large. This team rose to the challenge and ultimately introduced Conyers/Rockdale County to the world.

The summer of 1996 was an exciting time for the entire community. More than 600,000 visitors traveled in and around Conyers/Rockdale during the period of the Centennial Olympic Games. Residents, tourists, Olympians and their families, and television audiences around the globe watched the equestrian events, the first ever mountain bike competition, and the final two events of the modern pentathlon being

held at the Georgia International Horse Park (GIHP)!

The Olympic legacy continues . . . The Georgia International Horse Park, open year-round, hosts events nearly every day of the year including

equestrian competitions, festivals, rodeos, and corporate events. In addition, the Park includes a 173-acre nature preserve called the Big Haynes Creek Nature Center offering a canoe launch, observation pavilion overlooking the wetlands, nature trails, and discover stations. With the Arnold Palmer-designed Cherokee Run Golf

Club at the Park and a hotel offering comfortable suites, the GIHP continues to live up to its motto of "Groomed for Greatness."

Soon after the Centennial Olympic Games introduced Conyers/Rockdale to the world, filmmakers started to take notice as well. While the diversity of our community's landscape from water riverbanks to rocky terrain, pastoral hills to city streets, and more may have initially attracted production companies to Conyers/Rockdale, it is the friendly support from community leaders, businesses, and government entities that keeps them coming back.

While the Conyers Rockdale Economic Development Council (CREDC) is the primary point of contact with the movie/television industry, the Chamber promotes community cooperation and coordination.

The City of Conyers Convention and Visitors Bureau assures that guests to the area know all that Conyers/Rockdale County has to offer. Financial incentives from the state of Georgia along with an abundance of varied locations, a dynamic and skilled workforce of film production specialists, and a dedicated camera-ready film liaison to assist producers and location managers with filming in our community have made it possible for the film and television production industry to grow and flourish.

Conyers/Rockdale County is known as the "Biggest Little Filming Community in Georgia." From blockbuster feature films like "Fast and Furious" (Fast Five) and "Identity Thief" to small independent films like "Selma" and "Miracles from Heaven" as well as successful major network television series like "In the Heat of the Night," "The Vampire Diaries," "The Originals" and "Legacies," "Doom Patrol," "The Resident," "MacGyver," and series' streaming on Netflix, "Stranger Things" and "Ozark," Hollywood appears to be at home in Conyers/ Rockdale County!





## A.R. "GUS" BARKSDALE Lifetime Achievement Award



A.R. "Gus" Barksdale, known as one of Rockdale County's leading citizens, was also one of the original founders of the Conyers-Rockdale Chamber of Commerce. A well-respected businessman, Barksdale was known as a devoted family man and dedicated community servant. Notably, Barksdale served as president of the Conyers-Rockdale Chamber of Commerce from 1959 to 1971 and led early efforts to

attract industry to this then rural farming area. He was a member of the Rockdale Hospital Authority and helped build the existing facility, Piedmont Rockdale, which is located near the intersection of Milstead Avenue and Sigman Road.

An attorney by profession, he was involved in many civic and charitable causes including Rockdale Cares and the Conyers Rotary Club (where he was a Charter member, past president, and received its highest honor: the Paul Harris Fellow). He was a champion of education and of individuals with developmental disabilities.

He recognized the value of every individual to be educated and supported efforts to improve the quality of life for those in his community. The A.R. "Gus" Barksdale Boys and Girls Club, built in 1977, was so named to honor his many contributions. His friends knew him as a gentle man who did good works quietly. He often said that his goal was to leave the community better than he found it.

In 1985, Barksdale was recognized as the first recipient of the Chamber's Distinguished Service Award. In 1987, the award was renamed the A.R. "Gus" Barksdale Lifetime Achievement Award. Since then, the Chamber has presented this award to an individual (or group) that has positively impacted the quality of life in Conyers/Rockdale County. This award is a tribute to Barksdale's legacy and the Chamber's sincere appreciation for the recipient's vision, leadership, and compassion.


Following his retirement from politics, he dedicated his days as a member of the Chamber staff for more than ten years.



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

He's tight as a tick when it comes to spending," Jones adds, smiling, "but he always finds a way to offer programs that help members and the community."

A seasoned Chamber executive, Boscarino knows programs come and go as needs and interests change. However, a few of his ideas have been enduring. For example, the Entrepreneurial Academy that helps aspiring entrepreneurs learn from local experts about the ins and outs of starting a business, is now in its 20th year. Member networking opportunities such as Leads Groups and luncheons that began soon after Boscarino arrived have evolved and continue to be offered regularly.

The publication, "A Helpful Guide to Starting and Growing a Business in Rockdale County," developed by Boscarino provides important resources to aspiring business owners.

This commitment to small business and entrepreneurship contributed to the Chamber being named in 2004 as one of the first Entrepreneur-Friendly Communities by the Georgia Department of Economic Development under Governor Sonny Perdue.

In 2011, the Conyers-Rockdale Chamber of Commerce received designation as a Georgia Certified Chamber. Modeled



Recognized by the Georgia Association of Chamber of Commerce Executives (GACCE) as the Chamber Executive of the Year in 2012, he is highly regarded in his field, by his peers and by the countless small businesses he has bettered. Boscarino began his career in 1981 working for Chambers in Clearwater, St. Petersburg, Tallahassee, and West Palm Beach, Florida, before relocating to Georgia.

He has served as a consultant with Chambers throughout the U.S., authored articles and pamphlets sharing membership strategies, and taught at the Chamber Institute for Organizational Management. Boscarino has served on the Board of Directors for GACCE, the Georgia Board of Regents for the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, and the Board of Directors of the National Association of Membership Development (NAMD).



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

The idea for creating a Leadership Rockdale class project was sparked initially by the Class of 2011. Class members thought to use their new collective knowledge to make a positive impact on the community. They researched ideas and decided to initiate an effort that was called Hands Across Rockdale (HAR) to celebrate the spirit of volunteerism through a day of community service across Conyers/Rockdale County. Whether it was light painting, spreading mulch, helping abandoned dogs and cats find a home, or even creating an outdoor classroom space, people from all over the community came together as neighbors helping neighbors.

Eventually Hands Across Rockdale was absorbed by other community groups who kept it going until 2018. However, the Leadership Rockdale participants were still interested in completing a class project, so the Leadership Rockdale Legacy Project began with the Class of 2015. There is no typical project. Each class identifies what they want to accomplish, develops a plan, raises necessary funds, and implements the project. The one requirement is that all class members must participate in the Legacy Project.

Each year, the concept for the Legacy Project is introduced to the class at the opening Retreat. Year after year, the reaction is the same – wide-eyed wonder and optimism mixed with a little fear and trepidation. Yet, in the end, every class completing a Legacy Project concurs that the effort was worthwhile. "Every class that has participated in a Legacy Project seems to build stronger connections and have a growing desire to impact our community for good," added Michael Hutcheson, Leadership Rockdale Planning Team and Class of 2010.

Graduates each year remark that working together on the Legacy Project and having something to look back on after it's over is one of the most meaningful activities in which they have ever participated. There is pride in accomplishment and joy in knowing they have left a positive mark on the community. As Rebeca Gibbons, Class of 2020, said, "It's amazing how a small group of dedicated people, even during a pandemic as was the case for our class, can make such a big impact in our community."



















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
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# A Place to Call Home

When you've been around for 70 years, you might need to move from time-to-time to accommodate your expanding family. Likewise, the Chamber has enjoyed a few "homes" over its lifetime.

Currently located at 936 Green Street, the Chamber purchased its current headquarters in 2012 and moved in during the spring of 2013. Lorraine Harrison, 2012 Chamber Board Chair, said she considered the acquisition of the building to be a great accomplishment for the Chamber. "Having a dedicated meeting space enables the Chamber to better serve its members by hosting educational classes, networking activities, and board and committee discussions at a central location."

With the Chamber, the Conyers Rockdale Economic Development Council (CREDC) was able to expand into the Chamber's new building. Thua G. Barlay, 2013 Chamber Board Chair, added, "This space provides the Chamber and CREDC staff ample working space and much-needed privacy for confidential meetings with prospects and members."

The Chamber and CREDC share the top floor of the two-story, 8,000 square foot facility while tenants lease space on the bottom floor. Board member and 2011 Chamber Board Chair Mo Talley, who headed the Chamber committee that led the purchase effort, said the new location "is an asset to the Olde Town business district and specifically the Chamber, CREDC, Rockdale County, and City of Conyers."

The Chamber was first housed in the Mid-Georgia Gas Company, which was eventually bought by Atlanta Gas Light, and located on West Avenue. On September 23, 1971, a groundbreaking ceremony was held for a new office building for the Convers-Rockdale Chamber of Commerce at 1200 West Avenue near Interstate 20.

In the early-1980s, the Chamber relocated to a small wood-frame house on Scott Street in front of what is currently the City of Conyers Police Headquarters. Around 1986, the City of Conyers built a 2,000 square foot brick building on Scott Street next to the Fire Station and adjacent to where Conyers City Hall was located at the time to house the Chamber offices. This building served as the Chamber's headquarters for nearly 26 years until acquiring its current facility.

Like the granite that rests beneath the red clay topsoil that covers the county, volunteers have served as the rock-solid foundation for the Conyers-Rockdale Chamber of Commerce since its inception. The leaders who recognized the need for and then organized the Chamber were volunteers. The board members who have governed the Chamber these past 70 years are volunteers. The men and women who have served and are serving on councils, committees, programs, events, and other activities are volunteers. Literally every aspect of Chamber work is supplied and sustained with the energy, expertise, and enthusiasm of countless volunteers.

Established to be the voice for business and promote economic growth and development, Chamber members and volunteers understand that the quality of life in a community has a direct impact on economic vitality. 

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
